Homework Policy

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Definition

Homework is the provision of appropriate tasks/work that is given to students to undertake outside of the classroom in order to further enhance their learning. This will be achieved through using knowledge booklets, comprising of knowledge organisers for every subject studied. Homework is an essential part of the teaching and learning process and supports students' progress. Homework is significant because it teaches responsibility and helps students develop good study habits. In addition, homework can help to reinforce learning from within lessons, stretch and challenge student's knowledge gains and helps prepare students for their future learning.

The Rationale for Home Learning

- To extend and stretch learning outside of the school day
- To support all students to develop the skills, confidence and motivation to support their learning
- To supporting and enhance the consolidation of knowledge, skills and understanding gained from lessons
- To develop effective study habits, ownership and responsibility for independent learning
- To engage parental co-operation and support in students learning

The Policy Aims:

- To provide a coherent structure for work taking place after school hours
- To support students by enabling them to prepare effectively for their lessons, examinations and other assessment activities, both internal and external
- To extend and develop learning and knowledge gain that has started within lessons
- To differentiate learning according to students' ability
- To support students in planning and organising time developing greater self-discipline
- To develop positive study habits
- To make home learning an explicit and important part of the learning experience
- To encourage parents to become involved in their children's school work
- To provide all students with the opportunity to develop their independent learning skills
- To allow preparation for future learning/class work
- To contribute to students making rapid progress in their learning

Types of homework

In addition to using knowledge booklets, there are many different types of homework, all of which will be purposeful, quality, varied and enhance learning gains. In years 9-11 these will include:

- Planned tasks/preparation (pre learning) for class work - tasks may be planned at the beginning of the year or term as an integral aspect of class work
- Project style work – with clear structure
- Research based tasks
- Self-contained work - a discrete piece of work running parallel to class work.
- Completion and extension, homework consists of completing and extending work which has begun in the classroom
- Study of material already taught in class for the purposes of consolidation and in preparation for assessment/examination/controlled assessment
- Reading – independently or directed to support literacy development

Setting Guidelines

Year 7 & 8

- Students will complete one page from their knowledge organiser per night, following the timetable set out within the booklet.

Year 9,10 & 11

- Students will complete one page from their knowledge organiser per night (2 subjects in total), following the timetable set out within the booklet.
- Additional homework will be set by subjects and this will be recorded on ClassCharts

Where coursework/controlled assessment preparation is part of a GCSE it will frequently need to be completed partly at home, as such it will be a core part of the homework programme. This should be made clear to all students.

New GCSE specifications mean there is less coursework in several subjects and none at all in others. Similarly, some new GCSE specifications also place greater emphasis on Non Examination Assessment (NEA) and terminal examinations. This will potentially change the nature of some homework as students will need to prepare for assignments or revise for examinations.

Sanctions

We place a great emphasis on the completion of **all** homework. Therefore, failure to do so will result in the following sanctions:

Failure to submit homework on time (first offence)	→	Re-submission date issued to student
Failure to submit homework on resubmission date	→	Tuesday break time detention where work will be completed
Failure to attend break time detention and/or complete work	→	One hour after school detention (Wednesday) where outstanding homework will be completed
Failure to attend the one hour afterschool detention on a Wednesday		Break, lunch and afterschool detention on Thursday

Students will be required to complete any outstanding work during the afterschool detention, resources will be provided by teachers where needed.

Isca Academy recommendations for Homework

The government recommendations were scrapped for this in March 2012.

We recommend that teachers set some recommendations of timing against individual home learning tasks.

Roles and Responsibilities

Role of the Class Teacher Teacher Standards expectations – 4.3

Plan and teach well-structured lessons-

Set homework and plan other out-of-class activities to consolidate and extend the knowledge and understanding pupils have acquired.

All Teachers should ensure that;

- A record of the homework tasks they set for each class are recorded on ClassCharts to be made available to students and parents
- Students are aware that all homework should be dated and labelled in books/files or portfolio's
- Students are all aware of how homework is relevant to the topic/unit being studied and how it will be assessed (*Homework is never set for the sake of it.*)
- Students are aware of what is required and expectations of what should be produced
- Students are aware of how long they have to complete the task and a guide to how long it should take
- Follow up with appropriate support where students do not complete set homework in accordance with the sanction process and contact parents/carers when students persistently fail to complete homework

Role of the Head of Department

- It is a key part of the role of subject leader to make sure that appropriate homework is set as outlined above through the Academy teaching and learning quality assurance procedures
- Support the class teacher where appropriate to celebrate and support students to complete homework
- Discussing homework at meetings and monitoring its setting, feedback and impact
- Monitoring the frequency and consistency of homework across the department

Role of Form Tutor

Supported by heads of year, they ensure that students are fulfilling the homework requirements as set out in their knowledge organiser. This will be checked weekly.

Role of the Head of Year

Monitor students' completion of knowledge organiser tasks on a half-termly basis, and where necessary, contact parents to resolve issues when students regularly fail to complete these.

Role of the Parents/Carers

- Check ClassCharts weekly to ensure all homework is complete
- Ensure there is a quiet space where their child can complete homework
- Support and encourage their child to establish a homework routine so that deadlines are met
- Inform the school if there are concerns through liaison with the class teacher or the head of department
- Be positive with their child about their learning and support with tasks where possible. Whilst supporting and guiding their child in their learning is helpful, it is important to ensure their child is responsible for their homework and that tasks are completed as independently as possible

Role of the Academy Leadership Team

- The leadership team will monitor homework in different year groups/departments on a regular basis as part of the ongoing quality assurance cycle

Procedures for support in completing homework

- Students should complete knowledge organiser homework tasks as set out in the homework schedule within the knowledge organiser booklet. Departments (where appropriate) should share the running of detentions between colleagues. The purpose of these detentions will be to start the process of completing the task or to discuss the reason why the work is not of an adequate standard
- Students who consistently fail to complete knowledge organiser tasks should be sanctioned firstly by the class teacher issuing a warning and re submission date, then a break time detention. If this still is not resolved then contact with home and follow up by heads of department will result in an after school detention.
- Study Club – students can work on study skills and homework tasks in the library supported by a member of staff, after school four days a week (Mon-Thurs)
- Tutor Time – tutors allow time to teach students study skills, to monitor knowledge organiser tasks and support students to complete tasks set

Accessibility

Students with additional needs who may find organising homework challenging receive the following support in:

- Accessing ClassCharts which is where homework is recorded
- Using a variety of means to record homework
- In exceptional circumstances a reduced menu of tasks will be offered
